

Seven papers (Papers 9000/1-6, 9) and a Special Paper (Paper 9000/0) will be set as under. Candidates will be required to offer three of Papers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 9, including at least one of Papers 2 and 3.

9000/1. Critical Appreciation and Comment (21/2 hours).

9000/2. Shakespeare (21/2 hours).

9000/3. Chaucer and other Major Authors (21/2 hours).

9000/4. The Period c. 1760-1832 (21/2 hours).

9000/5. Literature of the Victorian Age (2½ hours).

9000/6. English Literature since 1900 (2½ hours).

9000/9. The Renaissance Period (21/2 hours).

N.B. Papers 9000/1-6 and 9 are available in the November examinations also at U.K. centres.

In Papers 9000/3, 4, 5, 6 and 9 poetry texts will not be allowed in the examination. In Paper 9000/0 candidates may take into the examination not more than six books of their own choice.

PAPER 9000/1. CRITICAL APPRECIATION AND COMMENT.

Three questions will be set, of which candidates must answer any two. Each question will be based on a passage or passages of prose or poetry, which may take a single passage for comment or more than one passage for comment and comparison. Questions may contain alternative sections. The intention of the questions is to test the candidate's ability to read literature critically: he will be required to organise his response to unseen passages and to present that response as clearly and directly as possible. The questions will be of a kind to allow the candidate's sensibility full play, and will not limit themselves merely to comprehension or paraphrase.

Neither prose nor poetry from before 1550 will be set.

PAPER 9000/2. *SHAKESPEARE.

Antony and Cleopatra:

Othello:

All's Well That Ends Well;

The Winter's Tale.

Candidates must offer a minimum of two plays; they may offer three or four plays if they wish. They must answer Section A and two questions from Section B.

Section A. 40 marks (2 x 20). Questions requiring explanation, comment and appreciation on passages from the plays prescribed. Two passages from each play will be set, and candidates will be required to answer on two of these, one from each of two plays.

Section B. 60 marks (2 x 30). General questions on the significance, subject-matter and dramatic qualities of the plays prescribed.

Paper 9000/3. *Chaucer and other Major Authors.

A) Home and Caribbean centres only.

Candidates will be required to offer the Chaucer text and any two of the other rescribed texts. Part 1 [40 marks (2 x 20)] is a compulsory question requiring explanation, comment, appreciation and, where appropriate, paraphrasing. In this question, candidates will be required to answer on the Chaucer text and on one other ext.

Set also for 1983. See note on editions under English Literature (p. 6) In Part II [60 marks (2 x 30)] general essay questions will be set on all texts. Candidates may choose freely provided that at least three texts, including the Chaucer, are covered in all.

N.B. Candidates are required to answer on two different texts in Part II.

(B) Overseas HSC/A centres only.

Candidates will be required to offer any three texts and to answer Question 1 (involving explanation, comment, appreciation and, where appropriate, paraphrasing) on two of these. Two other general essay questions must be answered, including at least one question on a text not chosen in answering Question 1. Candidates may not answer two Part II questions on the same text.

N.B. To answer the questions on Chaucer satisfactorily, it is necessary to have read the original text.

PAPER 9000/4. THE PERIOD C. 1760-1832.

Candidates must answer four questions, covering four of the prescribed texts.

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PAPER 9000/6. ENGLISH LITERATURE SINCE 1900.

All candidates must answer four questions, covering four of the prescribed texts.

Ford Madox Ford, Memories and Impressions (Penguin);

Edward Thomas, Selected Poems (Fabet);

Virginia Woolf, The Waves;

'Auden, Selected Poems (Faber);

'Raiph Ellison, Invisible Man.

'Arden, Serjeant Musgrave's Dance;

'Sylvia Plath, Ariel (Faber);

Ngugi, A Grain of Wheat.

PAPER 9000/9. THE RENAISSANCE PERIOD.

Candidates must answer four questions on four of the prescribed authors or anthologies, including at least one from section (i). It is not compulsory to answer any question from section (ii).

Special Paper (Available at Home centres only)

PAPER 9000/0 (3 hours) will be divided into two parts, as shown below; candidates will be required to answer three questions in all, one from Part I and two from Part II.

The examiners are looking for a good knowledge of the texts, imaginative and personal responses to them, as well as the ability to present considered, individual and relevant answers in clear, readable English.

Part 1. Practical criticism. This section will contain unprepared passages of literary prose and verse for exposition, comment, or comparison. The passages may be drawn from any period of English literature after 1300 but, when passages are set from the period 1300-1600, alternative passages from a later period will also be set. Candidates may choose either the prose or the verse passage.

Part II. Questions on literary topics and themes of general interest in the study of English literature from Chaucer to the present day. Questions on particular aspects of the work of Chaucer and Shakespeare will be included: the remaining questions will not be based on the work of individual writers but will allow candidates to write specifically on their own reading. Candidates will be asked to discuss issues which might arise from any of the various literary genres – drama, lyrical poetry, the novel, for instance – without necessarily restricting their attention to a specified literary period.

Such questions will be pointed towards reading outside the A-level syllabus, and will encourage the candidate to relate what he has learned by detailed study of prescribed texts to a wider critical appreciation of literature.
