


## Numbers of A-level examinations taken by candidates in England 2006 and the percentages attaining 3 or more A grades

## Aims, Data and Methods

This report investigates the numbers of A level examinations taken by candidates in 2006 and the percentages of students attaining 3 or more A grades. Data were extracted from the 16+/18+ databases for 2006, for candidates who had their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday in the school year 2005/2006. These databases are compiled for the DFES from data supplied by all the awarding bodies in England. They contain candidate details and national examination records for all candidates in England who have their 16<sup>th</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> birthdays in a particular school year. Records are present only if the candidate has sat an examination in a particular subject, not just attended classes. School type information was obtained from the Edubase database. Data merging and analyses were carried out in SAS (Version 9.1). For comparison, the numbers and percentages achieving 3 or more A grades in 1996 are given in the appendices.

## Results

**N.B.** Results here are restricted to A level candidates in England who turned 18 in the school year 2005/2006 and who sat their examinations in 2006.

Tables 1a and 1b show the total number of candidates taking at least one A level. The total number of A level candidates represents around one third of the population of England who had their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday in the school year 2005/2006. The modal number of examinations taken was 3. This figure increases from around 49% of candidates to around 63% of candidates if General Studies is excluded. The numbers taking 4 examinations decreases from around 24% of candidates to around 8% of candidates if General Studies is excluded.

Tables 2a and 2b show the numbers of A level examinations taken by candidates from different school types. Independent, grammar and sixth form candidates had the smallest percentages taking less than 3 A level examinations and the highest percentages taking more than 3 A level examinations. This was the case regardless of whether General Studies results were excluded from the analysis.

**N.B.** The '0' column here refers to candidates who sat only a General Studies examination, not to candidates who sat no A level examinations

Tables 3a to 3d show the percentages of candidates achieving 3 or more A grades at A level in 2006. Analysis was carried out for both the whole population of candidates (i.e. those taking at least one examination) and then restricted to candidates who took 3 or more A level examinations. Results show that almost 26000 candidates achieved 3 or more A grades if General Studies was included and 24558 candidates achieved 3 or more A grades if General Studies was excluded. This represents around 11% of all the candidates and around 15% of those taking 3 or more A level examinations. For comparison, figures for 1996 are given in the appendices (Tables 5a to 5d).

Table 4 shows the numbers and percentages of candidates from different school types who attained 3 or more A grades, excluding General Studies (analysis was resricted to those who took 3 or more A levels). FE / tertiary colleges had the lowest percentage of candidates attaining 3 or more A grades (7.84%) whilst independent and grammar schools had the highest percentages of candidates attaining 3 or more A grades (31.35% and 23.01%, respectively). The final two columns of Table 4 show the breakdown, by school type, of all candidates and of candidates who attained 3 or more a grades. Although around 43% of candidates are from comprehensive schools, comprehensive school candidates account for less than 28% of the 3 A grade students. Less than 18% of the candidates attended independent schools but accounted for around 36% of the 3 A grade results.
